

































West Meadows Primary School Advice for Year 5 Parents

It can be tricky to know how to help your child's progress in reading at home. The below serves as a useful guide as to the kinds of questions and discussions you may have with your children.

Vocabulary What the words in a text mean.

What does this word/phrase tell us about the character/setting/mood?

By using this word, what effect has the author created?

What other word could they have used instead of...? Why?

Predict

What we think will happen next.

What is another story with a similar theme? Do you think it will end the same? Why?

What has happened so far? What do you think will happen next?

How will the story end? What is another way it could end?

Infer

Using 'clues' to understand the text

What do you think...means? Why?

I think... do you agree? Why?

Why do you think the author decided to...?

Can you explain why...?

How has the writer made us think that...?

Explain

Saying what we think and why.

Do you agree with...?

Did do the right thing?

Why did disagree with...?

What would you have done?

Retrieve

Recalling key events from the text.

Find... in the text. Is it anywhere else?

When/where is the story set and how do you know?

Find the part of the story that best describes the setting.

Who is telling the story?

Sequence

Ordering the events in a text.

What is the overall point of this text?

What is the main point in this paragraph?

Sum up what has happened so far in 30 seconds.

Which is the most important point in this paragraph?

Do any sections deal with the same theme?
