
# **Elsecar Holy Trinity Primary School**





## <u>Year 2</u>



In Year 2 we have been learning all about the story of the Enormous Turnip. We discussed the importance of helping each other to think about the advantages it brings.

Sukkot – the Jewish Harvest Festival which lasts for seven days in Autumn. We learnt sukkah's which have three sides and a roof. These are made from natural materials which represent natural materials. We were able to design our own...





In Year 3 we have been learning about the Hindu festival of Holi. We discovered that the festival celebrates good overcoming evil. It's a very colourful festival that involves Hindus throwing coloured powder which looks very vibrant.

In literacy we created a story board about Prahlad and Holika. This story is why Holi is celebrated today and why bonfires are lit.

Our favourite part of our Holi week was when we baked some traditional mathri. We used food colouring to replicate the bright colours from Holi. They looked like a biscuit, but they didn't have any sugar in them. Some of us loved the taste! We also found out what the different colours of powder represent to the Hindu faith which was very interesting.








In Year 4 we have been learning all about how Native Americans celebrate Harvest. We have found this very interesting, and we have been writing non-chronological reports on how the Native Americans celebrate Harvest. Did you know The Gathering of Nations is the largest powwow in North America, attracting thousands of people each year? A powwow is a Native American gathering which typically features dancing, singing, socialising and a celebration of culture.

We have made our own Butterfly Dance tablitas, to wear in our heads, to bring rainfall.

The Native Americans made Hopi dolls to celebrate the importance of corn.









In Year 5 we have been learning all about how the Harvest festival is celebrated in Hinduism. We have learnt about a festival called the Pongal festival.

Pongal is a harvest festival – the Tamil equivalent of Thanksgiving. It is held to honour the Sun, for a bountiful harvest. Families gather to rejoice and share their joy and their harvests with others. The Sun is offered a "Pongal" of rice and milk.

We were able to write a non – chronological report all about the festival of Pongal and we learnt how it is celebrated over four days...







In Year 6 we have been learning about the Mid-Autumn Festival celebrated in East Asia. We learnt about the different traditions that these countries hold during this time of year, including the must-eat and very popular moon cake. We also learnt why this celebration began and then designed Chinese shadow puppets to retell this story about the famous moon goddess.
